Windsor Heights' Sidewalk Assessment Program to Promote Safety and Accessibility

Sidewalks play a vital role in the infrastructure of any urban community and Windsor Heights is no exception. They serve as essential links between neighborhoods, schools, parks, and local businesses, while also providing a safe and convenient way for residents to travel throughout the city. To ensure our sidewalks remain safe and accessible, the City of Windsor Heights has introduced a structured Sidewalk Assessment Program. This initiative establishes a formal process for inspecting sidewalks and ordering necessary repairs, replacements, or construction.

A Five-Year Inspection Plan

Windsor Heights has been divided into five zones, with each zone scheduled for inspection on a five-year rotation. One zone will be reviewed annually, ensuring a consistent and proactive approach to maintaining our pedestrian infrastructure. Through this rotation, the City aims to uphold sidewalk standards across all neighborhoods.

Sidewalk Construction Policy

It's important to note that properties currently without sidewalks are not required to install them under existing City Ordinance. Instead, the need for new sidewalks is evaluated during road reconstruction projects. If deemed necessary, sidewalks may be installed by the City as part of these projects, balancing community development with thoughtful planning.

How Residents Can Help

Sidewalk maintenance is a shared responsibility. Property owners are required to ensure sidewalks adjacent to their properties are safe, in good repair, and free of hazards. This includes removing snow and ice in the winter, trimming low-hanging tree branches, and keeping sidewalks clear of yard waste or other debris.

- Our Public Works crew has begun pavement projects for the year and will continue throughout the summer/ fall. Projects include filling potholes, preventative maintenance such as crack sealing and gap mastic, street panel replacement, and curb gutter repair and replacement.
- Reminder that the Storm Water Best Management Practices Program is available again this year. Windsor Heights is committed to increasing water quality and decreasing run-off which collect contaminates that eventually lead directly into our water ways. 73rd Street Reconstruction

Progress continues on Stage 1 of the 73rd Street reconstruction project. Storm sewer and water main installations are nearing completion, with paving for Stage 1A scheduled for mid May. Construction activities are expected to largely shift to Stage 4, adjacent to Clive Elementary, at the start of summer break.

68th Street Reconstruction

Stage 1 Sanitary sewer repairs and water service connections are being completed. Paving of Stage 1 is anticipated in early June, after which construction will transition to Stage 2, just south of University Avenue. Please remember to use 69th Street for access to Colby Park while Stage 1 work is ongoing.

What's Accepted?

Items that can be set at your curb include:

- Couch
- Desk
- Lamp
- Toys
- Mattress
- Chairs
- Doors
- Carpet (must be cut into 4' long x 18" diameter rolls)

What's Not Accepted?

Items that should not be set out at your curb for Spring Cleanup include:

- Appliances
- Hazardous waste
- Yard waste
- Broken glass
- Tires (can be taken to 6900 School St., June 14, from 8:00 AM-2:00 PM)

Make sure all your items are set at the curb by 6 AM on your scheduled cleanup day. Some haulers like to start before the sun rises!

4/21/25 City Council Meeting Recap

- Council discussed Reimagine DART, focusing on ridership versus coverage models. Ridership, favoring frequency in high-demand areas, aligned best with City values. Key topics included budget, rider concentration, shelters, and economic development. The Council supported continuing design efforts under DART's current budget amid rising costs and the need for service quality.
- Council discussed the Code Update Project, covering ordinance codification Chapter 1-60, removing jail time for most violations, updating fire codes, and refining nuisance, noise, parking, and snow rules. Proposed changes include mayoral appointments for P&Z, banning invasive species, and expanding citation authority. Staff is continuing to review the remaining chapters.
- Council discussed launching a Trap-Neuter-Release (TNR) program for feral cats, with support from the Animal Rescue League of Iowa. The program includes spaying, neutering, vaccinating, and releasing cats. The City will provide traps, update ordinances, and aims to implement the program by August. Council expressed support for the initiative.
- Lieutenant Chad Norris led discussion on the 2024 Urban Deer Hunt, providing an update on its progress and challenges. He suggested continuing the program with the same property owner and hunting area, as expanding it could lead to issues with public spaces and trails.

4/7/25 City Council Meeting Recap

- Per state law, a special council meeting was held immediately prior to the regular council meeting to hold the public hearing on the City's proposed tax levy. The levy will be approved with the entire FY26 budget at the April 21 council meeting. The special adjourned immediately into the regular meeting.
- CatchDSM President and CEO Greg Edwards gave a presentation of the organizations efforts in the metro.
- Held public hearing for the Forest Court Overlay Project. The bid was awarded to Grimes Asphalt & Paving. More information on the project's schedule will be shared after preconstruction meetings occur between staff and the contractor.
- Approved proclamations honoring Arbor Day and National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week (April 13-19).
